

Letter, Constance Moore to Emily Bissell, June 28, 1922

My dear Miss Bissell,

The Red Cross called me up the other day saying Mr. Kern¹ had brought in a lot of material. I looked at it and it all seems to be the first issue of the stamp. Then I seemed to remember you having said something about it, and I said to preserve it. You want it kept, don't you?

Are you getting back any returns for the West End R.R.? I have sent out 350 and I have about 350 more envelopes—I will send those, but shall I buy any more envelopes to complete the thousand? It is costing between \$35 and \$40 a thousand, counting everything—and I am interested to know whether the money coming in will amount to that. What do you think?
