The mix-up comes in this: upon receipt of your letter of Dec. 12<sup>th</sup>, saying that you "fear a snag ahead," I telegraphed to Mr. Magee at Washington for 200,000 stamps, anxiously hoping that he was less overwhelmed with orders than you. His telegram in reply implied that he had forwarded the order to be filled by your printer in Wilmington: + this so confused me that I did not know from just

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which place, Washington or Wilmington, to expect the stamps to come! They are still one: + I shall wire Mr. Magee to that effect. Your letter shows that you have nothing to do with it. I find Mr. Magee a rather <u>confusing</u> person! -- he has agitated me more than once during the last month.

I do not think we shall need any more from you: + I want to thank you sincerely again for your energy + kindness + promptness! I wish Mr. Magee were so constituted.

I enclose a receipt for the 100,000 from J. V. Cameron<sup>3</sup> of New York.
